

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

It never ceases to amaze me how much it really does feel like a family reunion, truly substantiating the club's motto, "It's not just the cars, it's the people!



TECHNICAL Q&A

Rear Hatch Glass - 1980 924

Question: Rear Hatch Glass Is Separating from Window Trim, Any Advice on A Fix Would Be Appreciated

Answer: Submitted by George Beuselinck

There are several threads on Rennlist and Pelican Parts 944 forums which purport to have techniques and materials to fix the delamination problem which occurs on the 944/924/968 hatches. IMHO, none of these "fixes" works.

I am unaware of any shop anywhere which is capable of and willing to tackle the task of removing the glass from the frame and reattaching it to the frame and giving any kind of warranty.

My considered advice is to purchase a new hatch from Porsche, if they are still available new, or a used hatch without delamination from a dismantler. In my opinion, Porsche did a poor job of engineering the hatch with such a narrow aluminum support frame. If you look at later cars built with rear hatches, they all have substantial frames to support the glass.

There is a YouTube video (https://tinyurl.com/476wpdn9) in which an owner had an interesting technique for resealing his rear hatch where it had separated. You can evaluate his method for yourself. I am encouraged that it might be a viable repair option.

Is It Necessary to Change the PDK Filter? – 2016 Cayman GTS

Question: The standard service interval for the PDK for 981 series is 180,000 miles or 12 years. I have seen recent recommendations that cut this to 60,000 miles or 6 years. I have a 981 GTS that I use primarily for track (DE) events. I'm not sure if the previous (original) owner performed any PDK service to date. I acquired this car with just under 20,000 miles. Since it's coming up on 6 years old, I plan to change the ATF and final drive fluids.

Fluid (ATF and final drive oil) changes are simple enough. The service manual

does not mention a service interval for changing the PDK filter which is an integral part of the PDK pan. Is there a recommended service interval for the filter?

While I'm happy to err on the conservative side, replacing this is a more involved process since the pan must be dropped, the screws require a yield-point controlled torquing procedure (which means renting an electronic torque angle wrench) and because the rear support plate must be removed to drop the pan, a rear alignment is required. I don't want to go to the trouble if it's not necessary.

I wouldn't open it till 90K miles. And yes, I would replace the filter when replacing. Keep in mind that the PDK is a very complex and finicky transmission which is not easy to service. I would let someone who is trained on how to do it perform the service

Battery Replacement in 993–1995 911 Carrera

Question: Looking to replace a battery on my 95 911, it has a side vent tube and it seems all newer batteries have 2 vents on the ends...where do I get a replacement battery? Necessary to have a duplicate or could I just abandon the vent tube? Thx!

Thank you for your technical question to the PCA!

By no means am I a battery specialist, but I do have a substantial amount of knowledge on batteries. What I can tell you, is that battery technology has advanced to a point of very minimal gassing. The newer batteries are thought to all have sealed housings, but actually the housings have vent channels built into them. There are people that say you can turn an AGM onto it's top and it won't leak acid, this isn't always the case, many AGM batteries can lay on their back but not on their face, or vice-versa Your original battery was probably a flooded acid battery; these always require a hydrogen gassing vent tube, most newer batteries are AGM (Absorbed Glass Material) batteries. AGM batteries have minimum gassing, so slight that they don't even have a vent tube connection. In closing, I highly recommend an AGM battery, they are superior to the older flooded acid batteries.

I hope this helps. Enjoy your Porsche
