5 Tips for Driving Your Porsche in Winter Conditions from Walter Röhrl

In many parts of the world winter is upon us and for lots of our readers that means driving on snow and ice. For those of us that drive a Porsche year round, be it a Cayenne, Macan, 911, Panamera, Boxster, Cayman, 356 or anything else, there are a few simple guidelines we can follow to stay safer in the winter. Recently, Porsche's Walter Röhrl sat down to talk through the techniques needed to safely handle our Porsches in snow and ice. While some may seem obvious, we suggest taking them to heart considering the source...

overlooked. Röhrl says, "Winter conditions reduce the amount of friction on the road, which means a dramatic drop in grip. So you have to slow down. Otherwise, you'll have problems when you brake or hit the next curve." He goes on to remind us that even though many of our Porsches have all-wheel drive systems that provide better grip when accelerating on slick surfaces, they do nothing for us when trying to slow down. In fact, the opposite is true due to more mass. "We shouldn't forget that mass generally keeps moving

straight ahead. And it doesn't matter whether the engine transfers its power to one or both axles. That doesn't affect the braking power."

3. Don't Take Momentum Into Corners. This might seem the same as above, but it's not. As Röhrl says, "People

aren't immune to the laws of physics and neither are cars." He's seen it many times at various rallies around the world. All wheel drive, like that found on the Macan and Cayenne, divides power among the four wheels to decrease the ability of individual tires to lose their grip giving you more traction, at least in a straight line. That better



- 1. Pay Attention. In other words, be even more attuned to the car than usual, and concentrate completely on what you're doing. Stay off your phone, don't text or fool around and pay attention to the feedback your Porsche is providing via the steering wheel and the seat of your pants.
- 2. Slow Down! This seems the most obvious of all, but based on those we see on the road with us, it's often

traction doesn't translate to a curve, but it does allow you to "step on the gas sooner and accelerate out of the curve", says Röhrl.

- 4. Keep Steering Maneuvers To A Minimum. One of the accepted precepts of motorsport, and something that's taught in almost every racing school we've attended, is the idea of "slow hands". That's what Walter's saying here. Any movement or input, besides the bare minimum, come at a cost. The only exception to that rule says Röhrl are exaggerated or intended movements that allow Porsche's driver assistance systems to help out.
- 5. Winter Tires Are A Must! In any part of the world where winter temperatures drop below 45 degrees fahrenheit on a regular basis you're going to want Winter tires over All Seasons and definitely over Summer tires. Röhrl

says that "Steering and driving maneuvers work only if the tires have enough grip on the road. So you absolutely have to have the right tread and rubber blend for cold temperatures." It doesn't matter what type of drivetrain you're equipped with (front, rear or all-wheel drive) your Porsche needs traction to grip the road for accelerating and braking. As Röhrl says, "Nobody should think that allwheel drive will make you safe in winter with summer tires." In fact, during winter conditions, summer tires will only give about 1/10th of their performance capabilities. That means only 10% of your Porsche's power gets transferred to the road and, more importantly, you only have about 10% braking power.



Technical Q and A

Sun Roof Trouble

Question: I have a 2002 Porsche 911 C4S, which at 53,000 miles, has sunroof trouble. The tilt feature opening and closing works fine and the motor sounds good! The actual retracting mode does not. The roof will open about 15mm and stop. Sometimes it will not close at all. I have a hunch this is common. What is the likely culprit? Is there a good illustration that will allow me to fix?

Answer: Submitted by Bill Burris. The sunroof mechanism on your car is relatively simple, with a switch, a motor and some cables, but unfortunately the tilt/sliding roof seems to be a source of trouble for many owners. Let's start with what we know based upon your description: the motor works and the switch works, leaving the most likely suspects the drive cables. The guys at Pelican Parts have posted some pretty good photos of the parts and given a fair description of what might be giving you trouble, but my money is on your getting in there and identifying the challenge right away because it'll be perfectly obvious. You'll know the cables are the issue if you can't manually work the roof forward and backward using the Emergency Sunroof Closing Tool conveniently attached to the inside of your sunroof motor cover (same panel the sunroof switch is on.) 944 Transmission Vibration

Question: There is a transmission vibration in my 987 944 that has about 44,000 miles on it. Someone said the balance shaft might be out of alignment. Any ideas?

Answer: Submitted by George Beuselin. Yes, it is quite likely that balance shaft alignment is the problem, especially if the sprockets on the balance shafts have been removed (e.g. during a water pump replacement or a front engine reseal procedure).

Here is what I wrote in response to a similar question earlier...

One of the challenges of owning a 944 is that there are idiosyncracies about the 944 automobile that can only be learned through many years of experience or study of the factory service manual. Unfortunately, quite a few of the mechanics who are experienced with these unique aspects of the 944 engine are retiring and leaving your cars to be worked on by rookies who haven't been properly trained. So, guess

what, if you are not lucky, they learn by working (and making mistakes) on your car. If the balance shafts are not timed properly, they will set up a vibration in the engine that usually manifests itself as a buzzing in the shifter at engine speeds between 3000 and 4000 rpm.

The 944 engine is essentially a 928 engine that has been cut in half, and, in order to minimize second order vibrations, has two balance shafts installed, one upper shaft and one lower shaft. Those balance shafts rotate at twice the speed of the crankshaft and do a pretty good job of reducing vibration. If you have ever driven a normal four-cylinder engine and found it to be buzzy, you should be pleased that your 944 engine can be as smooth at a straight six engine, all due to the balance shaft system.

Unfortunately, it is a bit tricky to properly time the balance shaft system. If you have to remove the sprockets that drive the shafts, they can be installed incorrectly, due to the design of the sprockets that has two keyways. One keyway is for the upper balance shaft and the other is for the lower balance shaft. Since you have to remove the sprockets before you can remove the rear belt cover, this usually occurs when you renew the front engine seals or when you need to replace the water pump.

There is only one page of the 2000 page factory service manual that shows the proper installation of the sprockets on the two balance shafts. That is page 13-4 of Volume 1 (Engine). The experienced 944 mechanics know that the quick way to determine if the balance shafts are properly installed is to remove the belt and to spin the balance shaft. If the sprocket is properly installed, the notch in the sprocket will point to the timing mark in the rear belt cover (roughly at the one o'clock position on the top shaft and the 7 o'clock position on the bottom shaft.)

All of the BS sprockets are marked with an "O" for the keyway which should be installed on the upper (ober in German) shaft. The keyway that is unmarked (or marked "U" for unter, German for lower, on early cars) should be installed on the lower shaft.

Once the sprockets are installed properly, installing the balance shaft belt is relatively easy. Make sure that the balance shaft belt is properly tensioned, which most mechanics who are not familiar with 944 cars will tension too tight, because of their ignorance and their lack of the proper tensioning tools. A balance shaft belt that is too tight will whine.
