







Findlay Tour and Picnic

ever wanted to know history tour." We started at Grand Rapids, Ohio, and due to a closed bridge there, went up the river to cross it. Then we worked our way east towards Fremont. The Portage River drive, usually fun, fell in behind an 18wheeler. We stopped at an unusual place, Harrison's Rock, There is a large flat rock in the middle of nowhere that was used by William Henry Harrison and his staff for meals and conferences during the War of 1812. We also had a geology lesson by Alan Kinker who explained how the rock came to be deposited there by the glaciers.

Thus educated, the tour continued east toward Fremont, formerly known as Lower Sandusky. Passing Rutherford B. Hayes' home and library in Fremont, Spiegel Grove, we stopped at the public library located on the site of Fort Shephenson, which is still guarded by its lone cannon, Old Betsy, and where Major George Croghan won

the seminal battle with the British and Indians.

The tour then proceeded up the Sandusky River through the town of Old Fort where William Henry Harrison maintained his headquarters during the War of 1812. Further up the river on Harrison Trail we arrived at Tiffin, the site of Fort Ball. There prudence dictated cutting the tour short and we went west to the Pits Rod and Gun Club in Findlay.

Ruth and Staci greeted all with a remarkable German dinner as only Ruth can do. Some of the tour members got in some target practice on the pistol range while all enjoyed the camaraderie of fellow Porsche drivers.

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



Technical Q and A

One Rear Turn Signal Not Working - 1990 944 S2

Question: The right rear turn signal/flasher isn't working. The front works but not the rear. Every other light in the right rear works. The parking light works on the right rear when the ignition is off and the turn signal stalk is moved to the right. The relay works (I tried a new one with no better result). The voltmeter shows less than 1 volt at the connector. Other than having 1 wire pinched or shorted somewhere, I'm stumped. Anything else to try before touching the wiring harness?

Answer: Submitted by George Beuselin. Since your other turn signals and the hazard lights (except for the right rear) work, then you have an issue with wiring between the fuse box and the socket for the right rear turn signal bulb. You should probe for voltage at both sides of each connection and at the fuse for that bulb (I believe it to be fuse 33) and correct the problem with the connection (probably some corrosion causing high resistance and dropping the voltage.)

New Top – 2001 Boxster S

Question: To avoid the top of the engine access problems that Frank M is experiencing, should I be specific and order a new top for a 2003 Boxster. Will a 2003 top with a glass window fit my 2001 car and allow complete access to the top of the engine. From what I have read I need atop with 4 bows.

Answer: Submitted by Pedro Bonilla. The convertible top assembly (frame and canvas) from a 2003 or 2004 Boxster will physically fit any 986 from 1997 through 2002 but it is not plug and play. There needs to be some mods done to a couple of micro switches.

A new assembly from the dealer will probably cost more than a complete car from '03/'04 but if you are lucky, you may find a used assembly from one of the Dismantlers. The '03/'04 assemblies are the most sought after so, good luck. Happy Porsche'ing,

Front Strut Insert Recommendation - 1986 944

Question: Need to replace front struts that are Fichtel-Sachs. Would like to install inserts. Fichtel-Sachs doesn't exist anymore. What type of inserts should I install? Sach? Sach-Boge?

Answer: Submitted by George Beuselin. My personal preference is for Koni and Bilstein shocks/struts/inserts. Buy them from a reputable dealer and you will always have the recourse of a lifetime warranty.

Oil Level Indicator Stopped Working Properly - 2005 Boxster S

Question: I had my car in to the dealer for an oil change several weeks ago and have driven it probably less than 100 miles since. When I left the dealership, the bars on the oil level indicator were at the top of the arrow.

Two days ago, the bars started to disappear each time I did a normal check by turning the key and watching the indicator count down for several seconds until a reading was shown. Yesterday, the bars were at the lowest acceptable level at the bottom arrow. I added a small amount of oil and the reading went up one bar above the bottom arrow. It is still at that level today. In all the years, I have owned this car, the oil level has always been at the top arrow (and sometimes higher than that if it was likely overfilled).

I do not have the flashing on the screen that indicates the sending unit may be broken. I have no smoking from the tailpipe other than the usual puff that is normal on startup after the car has sat a while. I have no oil on the garage floor. The engine sounds fine and seems to run fine. I am stumped by all of this.

Is it possible that some code had to be reset at the dealership once the oil was changed? When I had the oil service done, I also had the dealership reset codes for heated seats, garage door opener and proper spoiler functioning. These were all functions that I had lost some time earlier when I let the battery run down. When I left the dealership and got home, I later checked the heated seats and they were still not working. So, I called the dealer and arranged to bring the car back a few days later, but when I checked the heated seats 48 hours later, they were suddenly working so I never kept the second dealer appointment.

Any advice would be appreciated. I can't seem to find anything online where others have had the same problem.

Answer: Submitted by Pedro Bonilla. If you measured the oil initially when the car was hot (at the dealer) and saw full bars and then measured with engine cold and saw a lower level, it's just due to heat expansion. It was probably underfilled a bit. Fill it up to one bar from the top and always read the volume either hot or cold. Happy Porsche'ing
